- Google Scholar (<http://resolver.library.cornell.edu/misc/5973209>)

Google Scholar provides a simple way to broadly search for scholarly literature. From one place, you can search across many disciplines and sources: peer-reviewed papers, theses, books, abstracts and articles, from academic publishers, professional societies, preprint repositories, universities and other scholarly organizations. Quick guide to online reference.

- Paperboy (<http://www.thepaperboy.com/>)

Provides links to more than 5,000 newspapers world-wide. One can select the country interest and the newspapers available online will appear. Choice of language will often be available to the user.

- RefDesk.com (<http://www.refdesk.com>)

Refdesk is a free web site that indexes and reviews current web-based reference resources.

- Search Engine Colossus (<http://www.searchenginecolossus.com/>)

International Directory of Search Engines, which allows you to identify country-specific search engines.

Choose from over 250 small town newspapers you can read free every week. Browse and search scanned newspaper archive from 1865 up to the current edition.

Beware of entries that could reflect author-biases and of entries that lack proper citation.
